TANIA LOVE

Tania Love est une artiste torontoise qui puise son inspiration dans l'environnement naturel et culturel. Mue par son vif intérêt pour les matériaux, elle crée des pièces tactiles qui invitent à raientir et à être en relation avec les cycles naturels. Explorant le croisement entre les méthodes traditionnelles et l'expression novatrice, elle crée des pièces textiles à l'aide d'encres et de teintures à base de plantes. Au cours de ses promenades à Toronto et aux environs de la ville pour la cueillette de plantes sauvages, elle récolte des plantes qui poussent en abondance pour fabriquer de petites quantités d'encres et de colorants. Ses images sérigraphiées à la main sont créées à partir de ses dessins de référence botanique et architecturale. Elle apprécie les nuances et les variations issues du processus artisanal.

Tania Love is a Toronto-based textile artist who draws inspiration for her work from the natural and cultural environment. With a keen interest in materials, she creates tactile pieces that invite slower rhythms and relationship to natural cycles. Exploring the intersection between traditional methods and innovative expressions, she creates textile pieces using plant-based inks and dyes. On foraging walks in and around Toronto, Love collects plants that are abundantly available to make small batch inks and dyes. Her hand-screen-

L'individualité et l'imperfection sont au cœur de son travail, qui fait appel à l'analyse d'objets historiques et de préoccupations contemporaines.

Les magnifiques sculptures de Joon Hee Kim témoignent de son souci du détail et de la valeur du processus créatif. Les formes de base sont façonnées, puis décorées avec des éléments formés à la presse. De la glaçure y est ensuite appliquée et les pièces font l'objet de plusieurs cuissons jusqu'à l'obtention du design voulu pour la surface.

Joon Hee Kim's work explores the human existence by examining and reconciling diverse identities and heritages, as well as the compelling forces of beauty and desire. She uses the unique language of ceramics to compare the compared to the world. Xim's pieces are sculptural

to the world. Kint's pieces are sculptural interpretations of the human form as a vessel. Central to her work is the subject of individuality and imperfection through the analysis of historical objects and

COLLABORATE

SUPPORTING PROFESSIONAL CRAFT

Throughout the year, Craft Ontario continued to deliver services to support members, improved communication systems, called members for feedback on their experience with the organization, delivered presentations to post-secondary craft students, and visited craft shows to meet existing and potential new members. We worked with member Gillian Batcher to deliver a two-day intensive workshop, 'MAKING IT WORK: Defining Business Goals and Individual Success for Professional Crafts People', and partnered with the Ontario Arts Council and the DesignTO Festival to deliver a presentation and webinar on how to fund craft projects.

We further received an OAC Market Development project grant to begin working on the long-term goal of representing the work of members to markets outside of Ontario, and brought four professional members to the Salon des Metiers d'Art in Montreal from December 6 to 15. Through a juried application and the support of Adeline La of the Gardiner Museum Shop, our booth featured blown glass by Brad Turner, naturally dyed textiles by Tania Love, ceramic sculptures by Joon Hee Kim, and jewellery by Patrycja Zwierzynska.

In terms of staff, we thanked Olivia Spence, Member Relations Manager, for her work in supporting members, and wished her all the best in embarking on a full time career as a jewellery artist. We then welcomed Elycia SFA on board as Member Relations & Programs Manager in the fall.



EXTENDING IMPACT THROUGH PARTNERSHIP

Throughout the year, we reached out to existing and new potential partners. Of particular note was the opportunity to work with four graduate students in OCAD University's Strategic Foresight and Innovation program, where they performed an in-depth study of the organization and outlined critical points of opportunity for change. This dovetailed nicely with work to finalize our strategic plan through the support of an OAC Compass grant, and with guidance from consultants Judy Wolfe of Consulting Matrix and Mary McIntyre.

We began working with Harbourfront's Craft and Design Department and the University of Toronto's Department of Materials Science and Engineering to deliver a symposium in the fall of 2020 (which is still going to happen as an online event!), and were privileged to connect with York University's Communications program and Humber College's Arts Administration program to work with three invaluable student interns.

Through ongoing work with the Canadian Crafts Federation / Fédération canadienne des métiers d'art we helped launch a multi-year project that will analyze the current state of craft practice for emerging artists and the corresponding market, with the intention of helping Craft Councils and organizations across the country strategize next steps. We continued to be involved in the national Citizens of Craft project, and partnered through Studio magazine to deliver a podcast exploring the relationship between individual expression and community.

We further partnered with local galleries to build our audience through two West Queen West art crawls, and worked with the Canadian Society of Decorative Arts and long-time patron, Diana Rietberger, to give a presentation on collecting ceramics along with a tour of her ceramic collection at the Gardiner Museum.

Finally, with donors as crucial stakeholders in financially supporting our work, we were able to deliver our best Craft Dinner event yet, and raised a total of \$28,625 toward programs. Our thanks go to everyone that has committed to work with Craft Ontario throughout 2019, and we look forward to next steps in further building capacity through partnership.

STRENGTHENING THROUGH PRESENTATION & EDUCATION

Financial stability allowed us to build programming back up over the course of the year, and we delivered three exhibitions:

Housewarming, a group exhibition juried by Suzanne Morrissette, Susan Fohr, and Sajdeep Soomal, explored the concept of home through objects that question and evoke the experiences of both belonging and not belonging. The Body Has Reasons Which Reason Knows Not Of featured the ceramic work of Andrea Piller, Aneela Dias-D'Sousa, Annika Hoefs, Bernadette Pratt, Catherine Jones, Gracia Isabel Gómez Cantoya, Heidi McKenzie, Lesley McInally, Lisa Walter, Mary McKenzie, Mimi Kokai and Susan Low-Beer. Each piece explored the relationship between the body and ability, and originated through participation in the *Muscle Memory* International Ceramic Symposium & Residency, which took place at the International Ceramic Studio (ICS) in Kecskemet, Hungary.

Craft Ontario '19 surveyed the work of members throughout the province. Juried by Annie Tung, David Kaye, and Susan Jefferies, the exhibition featured work by Amanda Rataj (recipient of the Best in Central Ontario Award), Brianna Gluszak, Hae Joung Han, Janet Macpherson, Joon Hee Kim, Judy Martin (recipient of the Best in Northern Ontario Award), Linda Brine, Anna Lindsay MacDonald (recipient of the Best in Eastern Ontario Award), Susan Low-Beer, Tammy McClennan (recipient of the Best in South-Western Ontario Award), Tanya Lyons and Wanxing Wang.

During the summer, we also thanked Kate Jackson for her hard work as Programs Manager and wished her well in accepting a full time job. We then welcomed Robyn Wilcox on board as Curator. In the fall, the Programs Working Group dug in to analyze our exhibition programming, and put in place a new system for 2021 that focuses on a call for proposals for solo and duo exhibitions. This change aims to support exhibitions that feature a full body of work, offer members the opportunity to receive in-depth curatorial support, and address the critical need for solo exhibitions in order for craft to be professionally recognized by the greater visual arts community and supported by awards of achievement.

CO Space

CO Space programming offers members the use of Craft Ontario's space to learn, create, discover and build community. Over the course of 2019 we hosted multiple meetings and presentations by the Canadian chapter of Studio Art Quilt Associates, as well as a Montessori School printmaking workshop. Tanya Lyons shared the 'Inside Out' exhibition that explored re-entry into community through collaborative art making with glass, and Ken Vickerson shared his love for the cigar box guitar through an exhibition of work and a workshop that taught participants how to make one for themselves. Mary McKenzie, Alix Davis and Hana Balaban-Pommier shared their recent ceramic work through an exhibition titled 'Vessel Elaborations', and FUSION: The Ontario Clay and Glass Association shared 'Waypoints', an exhibition of ceramic and glass work by thirteen artists that participated in their mentorship program. To wrap up the year, Susan Low-Beer hosted a reception and launched the catalogue for her solo touring exhibition titled 'Embodiment'.



Studio Magazine

Studio Magazine underwent several major changes, most notably, we said farewell to Leopold Kowolik after his eight years of service as Editor-in-Chief. We again thank him for his leadership and insight in building *Studio* into a valuable resource and platform for dialogue about Canadian craft and design.





Craft Ontario Shop

Over the course of 2019 the Shop grew in capacity through both sales and staff. The online shop showed impressive growth as our team worked hard to introduce more artists and work, and to support traffic through targeted advertising. As a result, we saw an increase in online sales by 127% over 2018! In addition to these changes, we improved Shop processes to create a better experience for both members and customers through the use of digital tools for scheduling, and communications regarding new inventory and features.

Shop staff continued to experiment with merchandising ideas and strategies to test our local market, including introducing a feature artist window display program in May. This strategy resulted in displaying the work of fifteen artists represented in the Shop, and not only drew attention from a Queen Street West audience, but also successfully drove sales.

The Shop also partnered with George Brown College to feature and celebrate the work of twenty-five jewellery graduates, and with Dorset Fine Art to showcase the 60th annual Cape Dorset print collection.

Marketing and Communications


Craft Ontario's communications team continued to evolve through 2019 with considerable support from our annual York University interns as well as help from valued volunteers.



FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

TREASURER'S STATEMENT

Craft Ontario had a very good year that saw the delivery of a balanced budget and figures that reflect stable operations – particularly when taking into consideration the challenges faced in prior years.

Of note, our working capital deficit increased from \$66,825 to \$77,622 (difference of \$10,797). Likewise, our operating fund deficit increased from \$209,716 to \$230,469 (difference of \$17,936). Both are primarily due to the \$19,230 write-off of owned inventory, which is the last write-off that we will need to do of the total \$190,000 donation received in 2016. We are privileged to have had a stable year in order to be able to manage this write-down, and maintain healthy cash flow levels moving into 2020.

Overall, the year demonstrated that we can operate sustainably in our current configuration, and with an increase in programming and staff capacity.




